## Remembering Nancy McElhaney

Nancy was a member of the Fellowship and a resident of nearby St. Andrews Estates retirement community. Two years ago, when Nancy contemplated retirement community living, her daughter Susie Taylor knew that St. Andrews would be a good fit because of the Unitarian Universalist presence among the residents and the Fellowship situated nearby which Susie attends occasionally. These factors were important because Susie's grandfather, Nancy's father, was a Universalist minister.

Susie tells us that as a child, Nancy would accompany her father in his travels as Superintendent of Ohio Universalist churches. Of course, Nancy was raised Universalist. Later, Nancy would come to understand that part of her father's work was to promote the merger between the Universalists and the Unitarians. Nancy was very proud of her father's part in the successful merger in 1961.

Nancy's travels with her father instilled her with a lifelong love of travel and the joy of encountering new environments. Nancy's own career began after college with American Airlines. Later she took a civilian position with US Special Services in France where she met the serviceman who would become her husband and father to their daughters, Susie and Karen.

Susie says, as wife and mother, Nancy led a life rich with volunteer and philanthropic work. She served on many boards and was President of the American Women's Club in the Philippines. Nancy counted 41 moves in her lifetime. Never did grass grow under her feet.

At the Fellowship we knew Nancy as elegant and gracious, attending services in person with Susie now and then. Early in June, Nancy fell ill and was hospitalized. Despite time in skilled nursing and rehab, Nancy's illness overtook her on July 11. She was 89 years old.

A private family ceremony will take place on the Gulf shore of Florida. If you would like to honor Nancy, she left a request that donations be made to a fund set up in 1963 in her father's honor. This fund provides scholarships to individuals studying to become Unitarian Universalist ministers. Please use this link:

## An Invitation to Soul Matters Small Group Ministry at Our Fellowship

“Through others we become ourselves” Lyv S. Vygotsky

Small groups in a congregational setting are not just about exchanging ideas; they are most fundamentally a means of offering sacred space to each other.

Simply put, Soul Matters groups mend the threads of spiritual connection frayed by the swirl of a shallow, frantic and materialistic culture that leaves us cut off from our deepest self, life’s gifts and needs greater than our own. Many of us come to church hungry to

mend these sacred connections that get frayed and torn. Soul Matters exists to support this journey of reconnection to life, others and our deepest self. We do this work of reconnection by listening. Fundamentally, that’s what Soul Matters is: an invitation to listen more deeply and intentionally, in three distinct ways:

**Listening to each other** - being listened to by trusted companions helps us hear our own voice again.

**Listening to our lives** - through spiritual practices and questions focused on our daily living, we engage the world not as an obstacle course to get through, but as a host of holy moments and voices calling us to greater loving and living.

**Listening to our deepest selves** - Introspection is often understood as solitary work, but Soul Matters views it as largely a gift given to us by others. Ironically, we hear that “still, small voice inside” best when the voices of friends speak and offer their presence in a disciplined way.

Together, these three sacred practices of listening – to each other, the world and our deepest self – add up to a more intentional and authentic life. It’s a journey back to connection, and ultimately a journey back home.

## Orchestral Masterpieces on Piano



This month at the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Boca Raton, we've been lucky to explore some beautiful and powerful pieces of music. During our services, we heard excerpts from Sibelius' "Finlandia" and Dvorak's "New World Symphony." These pieces, known for their deep emotional and cultural significance, have brought something special to our Sundays.

Sibelius' "Finlandia" is a piece that holds a lot of meaning, especially for the Finnish people. Written in 1899 as a protest against Russian censorship, "Finlandia" is a powerful expression of hope and resilience. Its themes and sweeping melodies make you feel a sense of triumph over adversity.

Playing it on the piano, even without the full orchestra, still brings out that intense emotion and spirit. It reminds us of the universal struggle for justice and freedom, something that resonates deeply in our hearts.

On the other hand, Dvorak's "New World Symphony" captures the essence of discovery and the beauty of cultural exchange. Composed during Dvorak's time in the United States, it was inspired by Native American music and African American spirituals. The symphony's familiar themes, especially the "Largo" movement, evoke a sense of longing and nostalgia. Performing these excerpts on the piano lets us appreciate the intricate melodies and harmonies in a new way. It's a reminder of how music can bridge cultural divides and create a sense of shared humanity.

Adapting these orchestral works for the piano has its challenges, especially when trying to capture their full essence in a shorter, more intimate format. But this transformation also allows us to see these pieces from a different perspective. The piano, with its versatility, can carry the magnificence of a full orchestra while providing a more personal connection to the music. Playing these pieces, even in their shorter versions, shows how timeless and powerful great music can be, regardless of the medium.

For those who want to experience the full impact of these masterpieces, I highly recommend listening to the Berlin Philharmonic's recordings of Sibelius' "Finlandia" and Dvorak's "New World Symphony," conducted by Herbert von Karajan. These recordings capture the dynamic range and emotional depth of both works beautifully. Von Karajan's interpretation brings out the nuances and richness of these pieces, offering a listening experience that's both profound and moving. Listening to this recording can deepen our appreciation of the music and its transformative power, whether in a grand concert hall or within the intimate setting of our fellowship.

We employed an interim minister, Rev. Kathy Rickey, to guide us through a transition to a different UUFBR, and to identify issues we want to examine. In 2023, the UUA recommended amendments to the 7 Principles that resulted in a spiritual and philosophical discussion among our members which is ongoing.

Rev. Kathy leaves UUFBR at the end of August. On behalf of the Board and members, we thank Rev. Kathy for her listening to our many issues, of providing guidance and advice, for expanding our horizons with her services and discussions, and for opening up new possibilities.

As Rev. Kathy readies herself for her new journey, UUFBR is now faced with becoming a lay-led congregation. For many, this prospect is unsettling. Yet it is also a time for exploring a re-envisioned UUFBR. We are now entering another opportunity for transformation.

Over the past couple of months, the Board has held Saturday meetings to begin this exploration, to explore where UUFBR has been, what we, as a congregation, want from and for UUFBR, and we can create for our future. To help the Board and leadership with re-imagining UUFBR, we have developed a survey. The survey asks a variety of questions – from what you like and don't like about UUFBR, to your spiritual journey and intellectual growth wishes, to community participation – and more. Participating in this survey will help leadership plan for the next phase of UUFBR life. The survey takes about 15 minutes.

We want everyone's point of view. Therefore, we've provided three ways to participate:

- First, Ruth will send an email with a link to SurveyMonkey. You can complete the survey online once you receive it.
- Second, Ruth will have paper copies of the survey in the office, if you are more comfortable with paper and pen. Just fill it out and return it to Ruth.
- Third, you can click the link at the bottom of the email Ruth sends, and someone will call you to arrange an in-person conversation.

The survey is anonymous, unless you wish to include your name.

Once you receive the survey, if you have questions, you may contact Jennifer Ligeti or Patricia Rogers--they are here to help.

So, I close by asking you: do you have 15 minutes? It will help create a more consequential future at UUFBR.

**“The Reality of Transitional Ministry:  
Why Moses Could Not Cross the River Jordan” cont.**

According to Rabbi Jonathon Sacks, Moses was a leader of his time and circumstance, tasked with bringing the Israelites through a transitional period from slavery to freedom. A different skill set would be needed to take the Israelites from being nomads in the desert to settlement in a land of plenty. Further, Rabbi Sacks points out,

“Leadership is a function of time... Each age produces its leaders, and each leader is a function of an age... A leader must be sensitive to the call of the hour - this hour, this generation, this chapter in the long story of a people. And because he or she is of a specific generation, even the greatest leader cannot meet the challenges of a different generation. That is not a failing. It is the existential condition of humanity.”

Indeed, this is true of Interim Ministry. It is about the current chapter in the long story of this Fellowship. My task has been to lead you from Rev. Harris’ retirement to the shores of a new ministry and new era for the Fellowship. We began the work of transitional ministry together on September 1, 2022. Our time together will end August 31, 2024. In this two-year span, we have engaged in specific tasks intended to prepare you for a new way of being. Unlike the Israelites, we don’t have 40 years to transition. Your learning, your growth, your readiness for the next chapter must be gained in a much shorter span of time. Therefore, the interim ministry program is designed to concentrate and expedite your readiness with recommended tasks to be completed by the interim minister and the congregation. Given that process, the following areas were determined to be priorities for the interim period:

- Leadership Development and Assessing Governance Structures – Board of Trustees, By-laws, and Shared Ministry,
- Hospitality/Meaning of Membership,
- Stewardship Development
- Heritage/History Research,
- Explore identity – what does the foregoing transitional work of the congregation mean in terms of who UUFBR is and why the Fellowship exists,
- Renew Mission and Vision
- Discern the best option for bringing in a new minister.

All of these areas have been addressed and much has been accomplished. Projects such as heritage/history and mission/vision have been taken up more recently. While many tasks remain in each area, I believe leadership and various members of the Fellowship have taken ownership of said work and will continue on track, regardless of my presence. Therefore, like Moses, my journey with you ends before the transition is complete but you are not far off. The most important achievement of the journey is this: just as the Israelites were transformed by their journey, so have you been transformed. It may not seem like it, but I am witness to what happened when you peered into the future of this Fellowship and rather than shying away from the challenge of the work ahead, you took up the reins with gusto. You have found your strength, your confidence. You know what to do. Do it with all the hope, faith, and love you can muster.

It has been my honor to serve you. I will miss you. Every one of you. It is not my fate to know the rest of your journey. Fortunately, I don't have to die of old age for that to be so, but it is the professional pledge of the Interim Minister to absent oneself from the life of the congregation they have served. We get two years, one chapter in the life of the congregation. And if, together, we've do our jobs right, it's all that's needed.
